VICTORIA.

At the end of last month, a little girl, whose parents are German colonists, named Miller, residing near Victoria, on the Traiguén River, met with a shocking death by fire.

The conduct of some of the gentlemen who accompanied the President here, at the banquet given on the day the Railway was opened, has been subject of much comment in social circles during the past few days.

The President of the Railway, who was accompanied by a number of gentlemen, appears that the conduct of a number of these gentlemen was not only highly reprehensible, but altogether unbecomingly so.

When inside the banquet hall their behavior was even worse, the presence of the President seeming to be no deterrent. They seized hold of some of the viands provided, such as hams, etc., and the champagne, taking them into the railway carriages waiting for their return journey.

Two remarkable cases have recently been before one of the Santiago Criminal Courts and the Santiago Court of Appeal. In the one a woman accused a man of having killed her husband, and the accused was arrested and cast into prison.

In the second case, a female of good family was proceeding further south towards Temuco a considerable number are being employed to work on the line in this neighbourhood, many of these being colonists and their sons whose farms were contiguous to the line.

In the course of the trial it was discovered that the father of the female in question was the real incendiary, and that she and her brother were accessories before the fact.

The object of the incendiaries was to obtain an insurance of 20,000 dollars on stock not worth 10,000. The father has been sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment, the son to nine, and the daughter to three.

MURDERS.—An Italian immigrant, named Pussini, shot and killed a countryman, named Mori, at Concepcion, on Monday night.

OFFENCES AGAINST LIFE AND PROPERTY.—A few days ago a gang of bandits attacked and plundered several houses at Pillahuen, Lumaco subdelegation, and besides committing other atrocities they deliberately shot dead five defenceless men.

ACCIDENTS.—A sad accident occurred on the outskirts of Santiago on the morning of the 6th instant. A vehicle containing eleven passengers and drawn by four horses was proceeding to Talagante, and when approaching the suburbs of Santiago, the driver dropped a rein, and in endeavouring to pick it up he fell off his seat among the horses and was kicked and run over and so severely injured that he died in a few hours.

A fatal boat accident occurred off Mocha Island on the 30th ult. A boat manned by eight men put off from the island to the assistance of a lighter, loaded with produce, when the small craft was carried by an enormous wave on to some rocks, and of the eight hands only one escaped.

SERIOUS OCCURRENCE.—The mangled body of a man, named Guillermo O'Hernandez, was found lying near Chivilingo tunnel, Arica Railway, on the 2nd instant. It was at first supposed that he had been caught by a train, but certain circumstances have come to light which lead to the belief that he was murdered and that the body was placed on the line in order that the indications of a crime might be obliterated.

ATTEMPT TO BREAK JAIL.—A PRISONER KILLED AND SEVERAL PERSONS WOUNDED.—Considerable alarm was created in the vicinity of Concepcion jail on the afternoon of the 6th instant, in consequence of a report to the effect that the prisoners were engaged in a desperate effort to make their escape.

A local paper says the guard and many of the prisoners were the worse for liquor, which circumstance leaves no room for doubt that the soldiers and the convicts had been drinking together. At any rate, about half-past four in the afternoon a considerable number of prisoners, armed with iron bars, blades, pieces of wood, knives, etc., threw themselves upon the gate at the entrance to the prisoners' ward and made a desperate effort to force it open.

Just at this moment the guard was reinforced by twenty armed police men, but the prisoners far from being cowed by the arrival of the additional force, threatened to kill anybody and everybody who entered the ward. In reply to the threat a sergeant boldly stepped aside, when the stock of his rifle was aimed with a blow

dealt by one of the prisoners with a piece of iron. The soldier, however, quickly brought down the barrel of the weapon on the head of the prisoner and laid him low. The remainder of the policemen then entered and the prisoners, to the number of one hundred, were disarmed and locked up. The jail is said to be in a ruinous state and in a deplorable condition.

AN INSANE CLERGYMAN.—HE ASSAULTS SEVERAL PERSONS IN THE ARCHBISHOPAL PALACE, SANTIAGO.—No little excitement was created in the Archbishopal Palace, Santiago, last Saturday afternoon by a priest, the Rev. Antonio del Sol, who has been of late some time past. All of a sudden the unfortunate gentleman entered the vicarial department of the palace, and commenced to use strong language to one of the vicars, and ended by picking up a heavy inkstand and aiming it at that gentleman's head.

TWO REMARKABLE TRIALS.—A MAN FALSELY ACCUSED OF MURDER. A FATHER, SON AND DAUGHTER FOUND GUILTY OF INCESTUOUSNESS.—Two remarkable cases have recently been before one of the Santiago Criminal Courts and the Santiago Court of Appeal.

A post mortem examination was made by order of the Court, and the medical report showed that the man had not been assassinated, as was alleged by his wife, but that he had died a natural death of pulmonary disease.

WHISTLED AND WEPT UNDER THE LASH.—Patrick Sheedy, William Leader and William Turner, who, some time ago, were sentenced to two years in the Central Prison of Ontario and thirty lashes each for assaulting Richard Richardson, a private in the Salvation Army, received their second flogging in the prison yesterday. Leader and Turner took their punishment in a dogged manner, the former whistling the air of a comic song while the lash was being applied.

A LION SCARED.—Some excitement was caused at Dundee a few weeks ago by a man containing two lions upsetting while Boston's Magazine was walking in procession through the city. The braver endeavoured to break through the van, but the vehicle was got into position before any damage was done.

TRIPLETS.—Mrs. Sharp, the wife of a workman, of Dundee has given birth to triplets, all girls. One of them was stillborn. The Queen's bounty has been applied for.

THE HAMPTON COURT VINE.—The great vine at Hampton Court is now (Sept. 15.) in splendid condition, and it is estimated that it holds no less than 1500 bunches of fine grapes. The fruit is now awaiting the Royal command before being cut.

THE EARL OF DUDLEY IN COURT.—In the Dublin Nisi Prius Court before the Lord Chief Justice, in the case of "Daly v. the Earl of Dudley," Mr. Meiners moved for leave to serve the writ on the Defendant out of the Irish jurisdiction. The intended action was by Mr. James Daly, of Dublin, to recover from the Earl of Dudley the sum of 5000*l.*, the balance of the price of a racehorse called Royal Meath. The horse was sold for 5000*l.*, and 2000*l.* on contingencies, the latter to be paid out of the stakes won by the horse. The 2000*l.* had been paid, but the Earl had refused to pay the balance of the 5000*l.* Counsel stated that the Earl of Dudley had written to the Plaintiff saying he was sorry he had not been able to pay the 5000*l.*, before, but he hoped to be able to do so at once. The application was granted.

LET THE COUNSEL WEAR 'EM.—A Paris correspondent writes under date of Sept. 22.—The storm of ridicule drawn down by the announcement that the Minister of Justice was about to issue a ukase ordering Judges and advocates to shave off their moustaches has proved effectual. A semi-official Note is published to-night, intimating that the beards of the Bench and Bar are not to be interfered with.

THE FIRST ENGLISH CHURCH IN NORWAY.—The Bishop of North and Central Europe consecrated the first English Church in Norway at Christiania on Sept. 29 in the presence of the Governor and all the civil authorities of the city. The Norwegian Bishop of Christiania in his robes, attended by the Dean, walked in the procession. The service was one of considerable dignity and those present were much impressed by the manner in which it was carried out. The Convent, Mr. Mitchell, to whom the building of the church is due, acted as registrar, and the chaplain took part in the service. The church, which is Gothic, is surmounted by a spire, and is dedicated to St. Edmund, the Martyr King of East Angles. The Bishop's sermon dealt largely with the interesting story of the young King's reign and death at the hands of Scandinavians. The service was attended by a public luncheon, which was followed by the religious and civil authorities of the city.

FAST COLOURS.—In the Chemical Section of the British Association, a joint paper by Mr. A. C. Gray, Mr. C. E. Cross, and Mr. E. J. Bowen was read, in which the authors stated that they had founded a photographic process, by means of which designs could be produced in fast colours upon cotton, silk, wool, linen, and other fabrics. The process was a very simple one. Professor J. J. Hunt read a paper dealing with fast and fugitive coal-tar colours. He held that the old ideas with regard to coal-tar colours being fugitive should be got rid of. They now had 300 distinct kinds of, which about 80 were extremely fast colours, and an equal number were moderate-

A GALLANT OFFICER.

HOW HE STOOD HIS GROUND AGAINST THE ENEMY'S CAVALRYMEN.—In the Nile campaign of 1889 Serra was the scene of an act of great personal bravery on the part of an English officer which it is a pleasure to record. It will well explain, says 'Blackwood's Magazine,' the kind of warfare they were engaged in, Bimbashi Judge, of the Thirtieth Battalion, had been ordered to land at Serra village with fifty men, as a strong party of dervishes threaten an attack there. He landed his men, and taking twelve of them with him, he proceeded on foot to the western side of the village to see if there was any sign of the enemy. Suddenly, a number of the enemy's cavalry appeared from behind the sandhills. The men with him precipitately fell back and left him alone. Calling on them to stand, he fell back slowly. There were seven dervish horsemen altogether. Instead of charging down on him in a body and attacking him, they tried to deliberately surround him. This enabled him to use his revolver and disable three of them as they closed round him. By this time the fourth man, an Emir, was on him. Judge, finding that his sword had no effect on the thick padding of the dervish's head, and, being a very tall and powerful man himself, as a last desperate resort, seized the man by the collar, tore him from his horse and ran his sword through him. Just then all his men came up and despatched the remainder of the enemy. The twelve men who had suddenly lost their presence of mind and deserted him on their return to their regiment went up to their commanding officer and reported the matter.
